### A Message from Pastor Abatelli

There was a husband and wife that argued over many things. It seems whenever a problem arose they would be anger and blame each other. They did not solve any issues but only created a barrier between them. One day the wife was driving the car and came back home with a dented in it. Words that should not be said were said by both and a divide happened.

A school board member and parent were at odds with each other over the school's curriculum. The parent felt the students were not getting the education needed and blamed the board and teachers. In turn the teachers and school board members put blame on the parents for their lack of support. They were in opposition to each other. Again nothing was solved but walls were built between them.

It seems problems and conflict do a lot to destroy relationships. It would not surprise me if the devil threw into our lives a problem "grenade" to destroy the relationship God has created. The devil has been doing that since Genesis. Even our own sinful nature does that too. Now and again sin "blows up" to destroy our relationships. When the problems come sin and satan feed all our egos telling us, "I am right" and "they are wrong, they are the problem, they are against me, they are opposed to me, they don't want to work with me."

Our sin and satan are bent on tearing apart what God made us to be in Christ. Jesus died and rose to not to make others the opposition but united as a chosen people, a holy nation, a people belonging to God 1 Peter 2:9-10. Galatians 3:26-27 says,

*So in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith, for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ.*

In Jesus we are all children of God. God did not spare His own Son to go to the cross to make us all God's Children, all of us God's people united in Christ. Jesus rose to make sure we know we are called into one body and one spirit, one hope and one faith. We are called to one baptism in Christ (excepts from Ephesians 4:4-6).

Jesus unites us in His death and resurrection with His forgiveness. We are forgiven for when we have made a divide and making our brother or sister in Christ the opposition. We

are forgiven for being on our side and not God's side. With His Spirit we realize that there are no sides among us as God's people. Even though satan and our sinful flesh, try to put up a wall between us. There is only one side we are on and that is God's. For we are a His chosen people, His Holy nation. With God's power it is us verses the problem, not us verses each other. It is us verses sin, us verses satan.

The husband and wife quickly learned that when they both contemplated a divorce and sought guidance for a godly elderly couple. The elderly man said to them, "What do you hope to accomplish?" The husband and wife wanted a solution to the problem and conflict. The elderly wife said, "How do you expect to do that against each other and not against the problem?"

They fell trap to what satan and our sinful flesh does with a problem "grenade." Like a grenade it makes a horrible mess and destroys things. When the elderly couple shared what Christ did on the cross to forgive and unite them, their outlook changed. They forgave each other. Then the problem became the problem, not each other. The parent asked why they didn't say anything and offered her help raise money for the curriculum. It never occurred to unite on a cause. The even sought to utilize parent s more in the classroom for the students.

When we see each other as how God recreated us to be, united in Christ things start to change. It is us verses the problem, not us verses each other. It is us verses sin, us verses satan.

Galatians 6 includes the third part of the exhortation section of the letter (6:1–10) and the concluding postscript (6:11–18). Points of theological interest in this chapter are: 1. The concept of the "law of Christ" (v. 2); 2. The fact that we are morally accountable (vv. 7–10); 3. The idea that we are "crucified to the world" (v. 14) and 4. The idea that what matters is "the new creation" (v. 15).						

**Gal 6:1:** "Brothers": In this section Paul talks about the claims of brotherly love even when someone is caught in actual sin. We may assume that a harsh corrective is necessary, but Paul suggests otherwise. "You, those possessing the Spirit, restore. . ." Paul urges gentle treatment of actual sinners. "You who are spiritual" refers to those who possess the Holy Spirit, Spirit-filled people. "Restore" suggests that this command is to be an ongoing process. Paul instructs that the offender be corrected with a view to restoring him, and he asks that it be done in a spirit of meekness—the task is a delicate one. While the treatment of offenders belongs to the whole church, each member ought to examine him/herself individually. Paul starts with the assumption that we are all "poor miserable sinners" and that our care of others must proceed from this recognition. If it doesn't we are likely to fall to temptation ourselves.

**v. 2:** Paul assumes that the obligations believers have with each other (he calls us "brothers" in v. 1), is based on the connections they have with the risen Christ. This is a beautiful metaphor that helps us think about what "loving our brother looks like." Paul gives us a way to think about Christian love and what it looks like. Paul reformulates what he says in Galatians 5:14, "For the whole law is fulfilled in one word: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself'" (cf., what Jesus says in John 13:34). Christ fulfilled this law in a remarkable way through his own faithful obedience even to death on a cross.

**vv. 3–5:** We who think that our strength and goodness are our own doing are only deluding ourselves. We must not compare our work to that of others because it will only feed our vanity; rather, we ought to scrutinize our own work and then rejoice in what has been given by God's grace.

**vv. 7–8:** "God is not mocked" the verb means "to turn one's nose at" or "to treat with contempt." Those who mock God are playing with fire because they will reap what they sow. The lives we lead now have (ultimate) consequences. The description of "the one who sows to his own flesh" and "the one who sows to the Spirit" is spelled out in Galatians 5:16–26. The future tenses of the verbs, the metaphor of "reaping what you sow" (i.e. the harvest) and the reference to eternal life suggest that Paul is talking about the final judgment.

**v. 14:** In 2:19 Paul writes that he has been crucified with Christ. In 5:24 he says that those who belong to Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. Here he says that by Christ's cross (i.e., his crucifixion) he (and all believers) has been crucified to the world and the world to him. For those who are not Christian, this world is the all-encompassing and only reality, and they must order their lives according to it. In other words, they are under its power. But we who have been crucified with Christ share in his victory. For us who are in Christ, the power of the world over us has been broken, as has our selfish love of the world. We are "dead to the world," and the world "is dead to us."

**v 15:** Compare v. 15 with Galatians 5:6, "For in Christ Jesus neither circumcision nor uncircumcision is of any avail, but faith working through love," and 1 Corinthians 7:19. What matters is "the new creation" in which faith works through love. Rather than being slaves, God's people are sons and their lives, led by the Spirit are lives lived in gratitude for the grace that they have been given.
