Helpful Information

When entering the hospital: In an effort to better serve your spiritual needs, if you are entering the hospital and want a visit from the pastor or a prayer in church, please call the church office with your information. When returning home, please call and update us also. Due to privacy laws, we are not always aware of member hospitalization. We don't always get a phone call from the hospital, and we don't use media postings for our information.

To request a prayer in church: call the church office with the specific request by Friday. For last minute, before-the-service requests, write the name of the person for whom the prayer is requested and the specific reason and give it to the officiating Pastor or elder.

To request a prayer from the prayer chain: contact the Church Office or Marilyn Daenzer 871-2879.

To place flowers on the altar for church services: 1) reserve date by signing the Flower Chart between the church mailboxes; 2) call church office before noon on Wednesday for notice in the bulletin; and 3) order flowers from the florist of your choice, asking them to be delivered to the church by Saturday before 6PM. Flowers may be purchased for the altar (one bouquet), the side vases (two bouquets), the pulpit vase, or the lecturn vase. Only natural flowers and/or plants may be used in the chancel.

At the time of a death: contact the pastor immediately and he will help you make all arrangements. The church makes every effort to accommodate the needs of the family in planning funeral services. Arrangements for organ and vocal music are made through the pastor and Director of Music. If a luncheon is desired, the family should contact the church office or pastor with the anticipated number of family members and friends attending.

Baptisms: To schedule a Baptism, call the church office. Baptisms are normally scheduled in any worship service where Holy Communion is not scheduled. Private baptisms may be scheduled any time in the Memorial Chapel when the pastor is available.

When unable to commune at church: call one of our pastors to request a private communion in your home. Additional visits can be continues for as long as necessary.

Memorial Cards: Within the Lutheran Church it has been a custom for many years to honor departed family and friends with a memorial card, which involves a small donation to a favorite charity or fund of the congregation. Memorial cards are available in the church office. **To join St. Paul Lutheran Church:** A person may join our parish by being baptized and through the Rite of Confirmation. Adult Instruction Classes are offered once or twice a year. Call the church office for exact starting dates and further information. LCMS members from another church may also transfer their membership into St. Paul.

When moving: inform the church office you are leaving and request a transfer of membership or release. Before requesting a transfer, be sure to contact the pastor of your new church and advise him of your intentions. Request a "transfer" to another Missouri Synod Lutheran Church. Request a "release" to any other church body. When resigning membership, inform the church office of your resignation in writing.

Address or Phone Number Changes: Please inform the church office of any changes.

Cradle Roll: Children baptized at St. Paul are automatically enrolled in our Cradle Roll. The child being baptized is given a Children's Picture Bible and the family has their picture posted on the board in the church hallway and has members pray for them. If questions, call Sherry Sebert 871-3084.

Books & CD Library: Christian books, videos and CD's are provided for our members to use. It is located in the corridor leading to the narthex and church. The weekly church services are recorded on CD's for those unable to attend services. Contact the church office if interested in obtaining a CD.

Parish Hall, Projects Room or Pavilion Rental: call the church office. There will be a fee charged, depending on the use. The Projects Room is not available during the school year.

Off to college? Military Service? The congregation seeks to keep in touch with young people away at college or in military service. Please notify the church office of the address away from home and help us to keep it current.

St. Paul Trust Investment Fund: is an opportunity to build the principal in an account and to enable the interest to fund church related projects. Investments are received anytime. Applications for funds must be made through a St. Paul board and can be found in the church office. Your gift to our fund is the gift that keeps on giving. When a member designates St. Paul Lutheran Church as a beneficiary of their estate, they can specify exactly where they would like their gift to go. Some examples might be (General Fund, Building Fund, Missions, School, or Trust & Investment.) If the gift is not specified, the gift will go to the Trust & Investment Fund per the bylaws in the church constitution.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Good NEWS! Statistics don't lie! How to stay safe in the world today.

Where is the safest place?

- 1. Avoid riding in automobiles because they are responsible for 20% of all fatal accidents.
- 2. Do not stay home because 17% of all accidents occur in the home.
- 3. Avoid walking on streets or sidewalks, because 14% of all accidents occur to pedestrians.
- 4. Avoid traveling by air, rail, or water because 16% of all accidents involve these forms of transportation.
- 5. Of the remaining 33%, consider that 32% of all deaths occur in hospitals. So, above all else, avoid hospitals.

But... You will be pleased to learn that only .001% of all deaths occur in worship services at church, and these are usually related to previous physical disorders. Therefore, logic tells us that the safest place for you to be at any given time is at Church!

And... Bible study is safe too! The percentage of deaths during Bible study is even less.

So, the final analysis of the year is to attend church and read your Bible.

The only true life insurance plan is knowing Jesus as your personal Savior. Faith in Him is what will save your life, not avoiding apparent hazardous places. "For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through Him. Whoever believes in Him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe stands condemned already because he has not believed in the name of God's one and only Son" (John 3:17-18).

In this lighthearted article, I hope you recognize that we live by faith and serve in faith. We believe that God will protect, provide and bless us because Jesus suffered and died as our substitute. Read this report and see how we worship Jesus for what He has done for us. We have studied the Bible to learn about what God intended life to be. Examine how we provided opportunities to hear God's Word and study the Bible, which then inspired various ways of serving others. God bless your life in the new year!

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

2019 saw, among other things, a continuation of our school ministry, our music ministry, our love and service ministry to our neighbors, and most importantly, the ongoing faithful preaching of God's Word and the giving of God's for-giveness. 2019 also marked my first full calendar year with you. A great blessing indeed!

2020 will see the continuation of our ministry, as well as new opportunities for ministering to others. But 2020 also promises to be a challenging year; yet as a wise person once told me, "Never waste a good challenge". This reminds me of the 4th Petition of the Lord's Prayer: *Give us this day our daily bread.* Take away our "daily bread" – namely the air we breathe, the water we drink, the food we eat, the homes that shelter us, the government that protects us – and we die.

Since these things are so important, why do we take them for granted and not express gratitude for them? As Martin Luther writes in his Large Catechism, the devil "is sorry that any one has a morsel of bread from God and eats it in peace; and if it were in his power, and our prayer (next to God) did not prevent him, we would not keep a straw in the field, a farthing in the house, yea, not even our life for an hour, especially those who have the Word of God and would like to be Christians."

The devil tempted Jesus with bread in the wilderness. What was Jesus' response? "Man does not live on bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God" (Matthew 4:4). Again Luther wrote, "Behold, thus God wishes to indicate to us how He cares for us in all our need, and faithfully provides also for our temporal support".

Knowing and believing this, we can trust God will "give us this day our daily bread". God is committed to caring for our needs. And He equips us with everything we need to do the work He's given us to do! For in this petition, we pray that we would look to God for what we need each day, so that we don't worry about the future; that we would receive all our physical blessings with thanksgiving; and that we would find contentment with what we've received from God's hand.

Some days our plates run over. God keeps bringing out more food and we keep loosening our belt: A better job, a promotion, a friendship, a gift, a lifetime of grace, an eternity of joy.

And then there are those days when, well, we have to eat Ramen Noodles and rice. Our daily bread could be a job loss, a demotion, a lost friendship, a debt, tears, sorrow, or discipline. Our portion may include adversity as well as opportunity.

Regardless, all our "daily bread" is important and comes from God's hand. For "every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father" (James 1:17). Therefore, like Paul, we must learn the "secret of facing plenty and hunger, abundance and need. [We] can do all things through [Christ] who strengthens [us]" (Philippians 4:12b-13). And so we pray, "give us this day our daily bread", whatever it is, and give thanks to God for it! **In 2020, let us trust in God, from whom all blessings come!**

The presentation was designed as informational- they were looking for feedback so they could improve on what they have to offer. No plans at this time to pursue.

-Board of Finance- New job description for Bookkeeping position. New description includes changing the position to bookkeeper rather than accountant; supervised under the associate pastor; including payroll.

-Board of Education- Wage proposal for new Preschool teacher, budgeting for \$14.00/hour, 21 hours/week, applicable employer taxes, with CDSP and CRP benefits, Motion passed.

-Board of Education- Wage proposal for 2nd PS teacher, budgeting for \$14.00/hour, 10.5 hours/week, applicable employer taxes, this is a split position between CC/LK and PS; total hours for split position is no more than 38 hours per week. Motion passed.

-Chairman. Meeting with the election 2019 nominating committee on September 10, 2019; Duane Weber's first term is up and he agreed to run a second term.

October: -Reviewed differences between PPO (current) to HMO (proposed). Change to HMO would have the smallest impact to employee coverage at a savings of around \$2,000/ month.

Adult Bible Study

Sunday Morning Bible Study

With a few exceptions, Sunday morning Bible study is held every week. From mid-September until mid-June, it is held at 10:00am, between the 8:30am and 11:00am worship services. During the summer months, from mid-June until mid-September, it is held at 9:00am.

Pastor Bruner or Pastor Martinal generally lead the Sunday morning Bible study. In 2019, most of the studies were topical in nature. There were 3 highlights of study. The first was during Lent, when small groups worked through the book, "I Am a Church Member". This was followed up in the fall with a 6-week session on the book, "Connected". In between, the Bible studies often focused on one of the weekly "Bring It Home" readings for that week. Another highlight was Abby Brown presenting on various life issues, from conception to grave, in mid-May.

In addition to Sunday Bible study, two sessions of Adult Information Class (AIC) were held in 2019, one in the spring and one in the fall. A total of 10 people were confirmed in their faith or professed their faith.

Attendance fluctuates by season and study. During the "I Am a Church Member" study, over 100 people participated. We pray future studies of God's Word would be as well attended in 2020 and the years following.

Thailand Mission Trip

Bob and I traveled to Thailand, "Land of Smiles" from November 30 to December 23, 2019. Our mission trip was to the Hmong school children of a village near Chiang Mai. Janette taught Christian songs and Christmas carols, reviewed the English alphabet, practiced saying phonetic sounds, and worked on simple sentences with the children in the 1st-3rd grades with the help of one of the Thai English teachers. God provided another young Hmong man who was visiting from Minnesota to be the additional English teacher for the 4th-6th grades. The children and teachers were so happy to see us! They were eager to learn English, and were so sad when it was time for us to leave. In this public school, teaching religious songs and talking about Jesus was not an issue, just a joy! Whereas 90 percent of Thailand believes in Buddhism, we hope through our ministry to the school children and showing our support of Dr. Fung Lo and his ministry by our presence in the villages, that many more seeds of Christian love be planted. Bob was a great help in the school kitchen and keeping our very rustic cabin filled with wood to take the chill off during the coldest week in Thailand. (40 degrees) We went on several trips with Pastor Lo up into other mountains to visit Hmong villages as he oversees 16 pastors in South East Asia as part of the *Mission in Christ Network*. We also did two partial VBS (no crafts,) for children in other villages. The underlying influence on attendance is hunger, as presenting the gospel without providing food (like noodles in a cup) doesn't work. Hunger outweighs the message and they will not come.

Strength and endurance were a challenge for me this trip as I caught a cold from my co-teacher, the first week, and that developed into a sinus infection for the remainder of my stay. Bob and I then caught the "flu" from our plane ride back from Thailand, but we are happy to report that we are both healthy now. We ask for continued prayers for Pastor Lo and his family as he ministers to the pastors with words of encouragement and review of scriptures, and for protection as he enters the countries of Viet Nam, Cambodia and Laos as they continue to persecute Christians and Hmong people due to the previous war. Thank you again for all your love shown to us by your support through prayer, monetary donations, and words of encouragement. May God continue to bless your heart for missions.
