FOCUS

Read John 6:1-5.

1. As the account begins, Jesus is ministering to a great crowd of people. What does the Lord do for this crowd? Why does He do this? See also Matthew 14:14.

Read John 6:6-7.

2. Knowing what He is going to do, Jesus tests Philip, asking how the crowd could be fed. How does Philip respond? What does this say about the size of the crowd?

:	3. While Philip sees the impossibility of the situation, Andrew hints at a solution. What does he say? What do you think he was thinking?

	4. The disciples were unable to solve the problem. What does Jesus do?
;	5. Look carefully at these verses. How many people ate the food? See also Matthew 14:21. Philip earlier said that eight months' wages would not buy enough food for each person to have a mouthful. How

	6. After all the people finished eating, Jesus directs the disciples to gather the leftovers so that no food was wasted. How much remained?

	7. Seeing the miracle, the people were amazed. How did they identify Jesus?

	1. The disciples tried to come up with solutions for dealing with the hungry crowd. They did not do what they could have done first—go to Jesus for help. How do we sometimes act like the disciples?

2. The people who saw the miracle wanted to make Jesus a king. While this might have seemed like a good idea, what negative consequences would it have had?
3. The people were satisfied with the bread and fishes. Read John 6:47–51. What did Jesus really want to give them and us?
